

## 2009-2010 GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

## **General Education at SUNY Maritime College**

SUNY Maritime College has a long history of offering baccalaureate curricula each of which include required courses across many disciplines, guaranteeing that our graduates have broad knowledge beyond their major fields. In 2000, SUNY established a common, system-wide approach to such a general education.

The SUNY General Education program requires baccalaureate degree candidates, as a condition of graduation, to complete no fewer than 30 credit hours specifically designed to achieve the student learning outcomes in ten knowledge and skill areas and two competencies.

The knowledge and skills areas are: Basic Communication, American History, Mathematics, Natural Sciences, Social Sciences, American History, Western Civilization, Other World Civilizations, Humanities, the Arts, and Foreign Language. The competencies are: Critical Thinking and Information Management.

All baccalaureate curricula at Maritime College satisfy the SUNY General Education requirements, with the exception of not including the Foreign Language area for which Maritime College has received an exemption.

The table (next page, first two columns) lists each of the General Education knowledge and skills areas and the courses offered at Maritime College that meet the requirements of each area. The competencies of Critical Thinking and Information Management are met by *infusion*, i.e., learning outcomes achieved in courses throughout the curriculum.

Students who enter Maritime College having already taken courses at other colleges may receive transfer credit for SUNY General Education requirements in several ways:

- a course is evaluated as equivalent to a Maritime College course that satisfies a General Education requirement;
- a course taken at another SUNY college (2-year or 4-year) satisfied the General Education requirement at that college;
- a course taken at a non-SUNY college (2-year or 4-year) is evaluated as satisfying a General Education requirement.

In the latter two cases, transfer credit is recorded via notations for General Education Requirement (GER) courses. In certain situations, such courses may be substituted for related Maritime College requirements.\* The table (next page, last two columns) lists the notations for each knowledge and skills area; it also shows allowable substitutions.

\*Note that a transferred course may satisfy a General Education requirement without satisfying a Maritime College degree requirement. For example, a course called "Mathematical Ideas" may be accepted as a General Education mathematics course elsewhere, but it is does not count towards any degree at Maritime College.

3 credits of Gen Ed: Western Civilization (counts for either HUMN 201 or HUMN 202) 3 credits of Gen Ed: Other World Civilizations (counts for either HUMN 201 or HUMN 202) 3 or 6 credits of Gen Ed: American History (counts for HIST 101 and/or HIST 102)
